## **HOW TO ACCESS MEDICAL CANNABIS**

## **A PATIENT'S GUIDE**

As of July 1, 2015, medical cannabis will be available to some Minnesotans as a therapy for specific qualifying conditions. Epilepsy/seizures are a qualifying condition. EFMN has provided this guide for patients who are interested in medical cannabis.



Tell the doctor treating your seizures that you'd like to be certified as having a qualifying condition for medical cannabis.



If your doctor certifies your condition, you will receive an email (using the address you gave your provider) from the Office of Medical Cannabis with a link to register online.



Review the items needed for <u>registration</u> in your email from the Office of Medical Cannabis. There is a \$200 annual registration fee.



This will expedite your visit to the cannabis patient center. Also, your doctor does not determine dosage, the pharmacist does. IT IS IMPERATIVE YOU BRING A LIST OF ALL CURRENT MEDICATIONS TO THE PHARMACIST.



A pharmacist will review your account, recommend dosage and a payment is due. Insurance DOES NOT cover medical cannabis costs. There are <u>eight patient centers</u> to obtain medical cannabis.



Complete the self-evaluation provided by the <u>registry</u> before your next patient center visit.

## **CONSIDERATIONS:**

- There will be no published list of doctors who give medical cannabis. You'll need to ask your doctor if he or she is interested in becoming part of this program.
- Parents can register for minors in their care, but caregivers must register IN ADDITION to the person under their care.
- Doctors don't determine dosage the pharmacist does. It is critical to bring a full list of medications to the cannabis pharmacist.
- There is a \$200 annual fee to participate in the medical cannabis program. Medical cannabis is NOT covered by any insurance.
- Approved ways to use medical cannabis in Minnesota are vaporizer, solutions/tinctures, pills/tablets/capsules.
